# Principal's Report

## THE CHALLENGE OF YOUTH

In recent years we have achieved our aim of training the majority of pupils to think and to express themselves; to express themselves not only verbally by discussions in the classrooms, but through art, music and craft in the junior years.

With a year longer at school, it is not surprising that students of seventeen and eighteen expect to be treated differently from the young teenagers in the same school. Many of them have a broader education, are more informed and wiser than some of the adults of their community.

With a study-background of economics and history or geography and science in their last two years, one can understand them supporting claims for a vote at age eighteen. A feature of 1968 has been the extent of student unrest throughout the world. If a vote at eighteen will encourage them to take an interest in civic affairs and problems of State on leaving school — and I think it will — then the proposal has much to commend it and the community much to gain.

But before they leave school, if we are to treat them differently, certain changes in the physical environment of our high schools must be expedited. Additional buildings at Ryde High, including a senior study centre cannot be provided too soon.

As citizens we must realise that the problem of provision for the younger generation, outside school hours and including those not at school, is not the responsibility of the Department of Education.

At frequent intervals we must ask ourselves are we providing them with adequate playing fields for healthy recreation? Are we providing sufficient buildings for them at which they may meet and express themselves and in turn develop their powers of expression fostered at school?

## DEVELOPMENTS OF 1968

### EXTERNAL EXAMINATIONS

On more than one occasion I have criticised the over-emphasis of examinations as undermining the process of education. Therefore the introduction of a better system of examining School Certificate Examination Candidates this year gave me much pleasure. Each Fourth Form student knows that in the subject of English, for example, his mark will be a combination of the mark gained for answering the three hour paper on November 13 and the assessment mark for this subject provided by his school. The two marks are of equal weight or importance, but the school assessment gives credit for facets of attainment not usually assessed in a theory examination. Such aspects of academic progress as the pupil's ability to communicate, his variety in expression, his participation in debate or discussion or drama surely deserve some recognition in the school's assessment in addition to the pupil's marks scored in internal school tests.

With this year's Higher School Certificate Examination, the examiners when examining borderline cases and making their final decisions for each subject will attach more importance than they have previously to the estimate marks for each candidate supplied by the schools. This is a good development because it will benefit the student who has performed well at school but for some reason or other failed to run true to form in the examination room in a particular subject on a certain morning or afternoon.

### STAFFING

The appointment to this school at the beginning of the year of a History Master undoubtedly improves our organisation. The additional master organises a new department and is able to give much attention to the cause of History whilst the former English History Master now concentrates on the many facets of the teaching of English and the development of the library.

Appointment of a clerical assistant this year to help with library work and the extension of borrowing and reading time to sessions before and after school hours each day, benefits all students and especially seniors.

Also, we appreciated the appointment during the year of a science laboratory assistant to handle and maintain the increasing quantity of equipment to assist with experiments and thus allow teachers to give the maximum amount of time to teaching.

### CLUBS

An interesting development was the formation of a *Computer Club*. It has been very active under the guidance of some mathematics teachers. *The Chess Club* more than doubled its membership this year and we are grateful to Mr. Cornford, an ex State Champion Chess player, for his many visits to the school to coach our boys.

Attendance at regular meetings of the *Camera Club* have increased noticeably and its members are rendering a valuable service for non-member pupils and the school.

### PHYSICAL IMPROVEMENTS, INCLUDING EQUIPMENT

A language laboratory is now one of the most interesting features of our building, and methods of instruction.

At much expense the Department installed valuable equipment, thirty booths and six remedial booths, for more individual work, in one of our largest class rooms. To date the laboratory has been used to improve the teaching of French and German.

Our telephone communication system bears a new look following alterations to our two exchange lines — twelve extensions instead of nine — and the installation of a public telephone.

Following financial grants from the P. & C. Association, additional equipment and teaching aids costing thousands of dollars have been acquired. They range from concrete

park seats, turf wicket roller and basketball posts to tape recorders, controlled reader, rear projection screen, seven clarinets, metal filing cabinets, and spray guns.

In ten months, library purchases alone cost over \$2,600.

### EXCURSIONS

Excursions are now interesting a greater proportion of the student population and covered a wider field during 1968. Geography students travelled to Narrabri and the cotton fields of Wee Waa, whilst science students climbed the Warrumbungle Mountains at Coonabarabran and studied the South Coast and Blue Mountains.

History and geography students from Narrabri High School studied the city of Sydney and were billeted and entertained by our students.

Manual Arts boys toured the Port Kembla Steelworks and last Monday, class 3A closely examined the State Parliament with the assistance of our representative, Mr. P. Coleman.

Pupils from Forms 1 and 2 have participated in many other excursions associated with geography and history.

## SOME PLEASING ACHIEVEMENTS AND FEATURES

### GROUP EFFORTS

Presentation of "*The Mikado*" by senior students and Mr. Clarke was an outstanding achievement and the three evening performances of this Gilbert and Sullivan production received the support they certainly deserved.

*Debating* teams entered all the major competitions, including the Teasdale Cup for boys and girls from Form 4. Sixth Form boys participated in the Hume Barbour, whilst boys from Form Five competed in the Karl Cramp competition against other high schools. Form 6 girls once again fared well in the English Speaking Union Competition.

Last year, *Form Five* students attended a one day *Conference* at Cheltenham Girls' High School, whereas this year's Form Five had the experience of acting as hosts to a similar Conference for Form Five students held in our Assembly Hall and organised by the Australian Student Christian Movement in Schools. The principal speaker was Professor F. Chong and practically all the Form Five students from Cheltenham Girls', Eastwood Marist Brothers, James Ruse, North Ryde and Cumberland High attended.

For the third term general meeting of the P. & C. Association, about 80 girls from Forms 1 to 6 participated in a delightful *mannequin parade*, wore evening, day and sports clothes they themselves made and by their department and craftsmanship produced very favourable comments.

The *Farewell Dinner* and Social for Form 6 was most enjoyable and certainly the most colourful yet held with Form 5 excelling in their decorations and, in conjunction with the Home Science Staff, reaching a high level of achievement in catering for about 300 diners.

### RESPONSE TO APPEALS

Our pupils can claim that 1968 is their most active and generous year. They have supported Stewart House, the Spastic Centre, sold badges for Legacy, participated with enthusiasm in the Walk Against Want and for the Red Cross Door Knock Appeal collected \$532.

### HIGHER SCHOOL CERTIFICATE RESULTS

The results of the school's first batch of candidates for the State's first Higher School Certificate Examination were interesting and pleasing. Of the 86 who sat, 83 gained passes in three or more subjects, fifteen gained valuable Commonwealth Scholarships covering a University Course, and thirty-two were awarded Teachers' College Scholarships in the original list of published names.

The successful students gained passes at Level 1 in many subjects, including English (4), Mathematics (6), Science (3), Modern History (4), French (3), German (3), Music (2), Geography, Ancient History, Latin and Art. They were also credited with 35 passes at second level full, including 17 in Mathematics and 18 for Science.

Students who gained passes at Level 1 in at least two subjects were Marilyn Spaul (English, French and German), Lloyd Flack (Maths and Science), Paul Fredrickson (Maths and Science), John Hawkins (Maths and Science), Christine Minter (French and Latin), Michael O'Loughlin (Maths and Music), Ann Thompson (Modern History and French).

Best Pass, based on the system used for awarding scholarships (total marks of the equivalent of the candidate's best five subjects), was that of Michael O'Loughlin by a few marks from Marilyn Spaul. In addition to two passes at first level, Michael's other passes included second level full in Science and second level in English and German. Marilyn's passes included Modern History at second level and Mathematics second level short in addition to her three passes at level one.

Last month, 93 senior students completed the six year course and sat for the Higher School Certificate Examination. We wish them luck and they deserve it.

Last week, 180 Form 4 students finished the School Certificate Examination papers. About 90 of them intend to proceed to Form 5. Although a greater proportion than usual appears to be leaving, the number who have just completed the four year course represents a higher percentage than usual when related to the number who started the course at this school four years ago.

### INTERESTING VISITORS

Last year we gained much from the presence of American student Kathy Schultz and this year we are just as fortunate. It has been a pleasure to have American Field Service Scholar Sue Gurley as a Form 5 student. Sue, who comes from Baldwinsville, New York State, is a guest of the Pickersgill family, with Hilary Pickersgill of Form 5 as the host student. We will be very sorry to see Sue return to U.S.A.

An interesting and outstanding one day visitor this term was Dr. Zake, a typical African who speaks English fluently. He has been Minister of Education in Uganda since 1962 and holds a number of university degrees in law and arts.

## IMPORTANT FUNCTIONS

Successful functions held during the year and not already mentioned included Careers Night, with forty visiting advisers, Open Day, during Education Week, the Senior Social, The State Opera Company's presentation of "All That Jazz" and, of course, the Fete.

## INDIVIDUAL ACHIEVEMENTS

In a competition based on the candidate's record as a school citizen, scholar, athlete and leader, as well as performance in front of adjudicators embracing personality, knowledge of current affairs and public speaking, our Girl Captain, Lynette Lardelli, won the title "Girl of the Year". The competition, conducted by the Quota Club of Ryde, drew representatives from as far as Wollongong and Penrith.

Geoff Frankish established a record by gaining awards of three "Blues" for sport in the one year.

Paul Godfrey at the Cheltenham Art Show won the under 18 years section with one of his paintings.

Phillip Andrew of 5A distinguished himself by his selection to attend the 1968 International Science School held at Sydney University a few months ago. Only 124 students from the whole of Australia were invited to attend.

Jennifer Anderson, 4A, was awarded a senior prize in the A.B.C. Commonwealth Literary Awards.

In Anzac Day essay competitions, our boys and girls were very successful in winning nine of the twelve prizes given by Ryde R.S.L., and six of the eight awarded by the Eastwood Branch of the R.S.L.

Of the 119 French students who participated in the oral examination conducted by Alliance Francaise, 115 passed and were awarded attractive certificates.

I am reminded that language students from classes 3A and 4A with two of their teachers showed the public at the Royal Easter Show how a language laboratory is used.

## ARRANGEMENTS FOR NEXT YEAR

With a staff of 57.2 next year, we anticipate an enrolment of nearly 1,100 pupils in 32 roll classes or 34 teaching groups for English. Due to our limited accommodation, fewer pupils are now drafted to us for the junior forms and our intake area is quite small and compact.

### FORM 2

Pupils for the first five classes are being offered a fairly wide choice in the selection of their six examination subjects. Their subjects are English, Mathematics, Science, History or Geography, plus one from French, Latin, German, Art, Metalwork, Home Economics, and one from French, Music, Art, Descriptive Geometry and Drawing, Commerce, Woodwork, Needlework.

Examination subjects to be taken by the sixth Form 2 class are: English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Art, Woodwork (Boys), Home Economics (Girls), Metalwork (Boys), Needlework (Girls).

### FORM 5

In Form IV, students are attempting 6 examination subjects, but in Form V, many will be restricted to 5 subjects: e.g., those taking a subject at Level 1 or those accepted in the 2F Science class and/or the 2F Mathematics class.

"New" subjects, including Modern History, Economics and Ancient History, are available at the beginning of Form 5 and students choosing any of these three will not handicap themselves because the courses do not require special study in the lower or earlier forms.

The following subjects are available for study next year subject to adequate enrolment and are listed in their probable option-groups.

Group 1: English (compulsory).

Group 2: Mathematics, Ancient History.

Group 3: Science, Modern History.

Group 4: Modern History, Economics, Geography, French, Music.

Group 5: French, Latin, German, Economics, Art.

Group 6: Ancient History, Home Science, Industrial Arts, Modern History.

A student taking only 5 subjects is restricted in choice to the first 5 groups.

## SCHOOL FEES

\$5.00 of each fee covers the use of library books, sports equipment, sports grounds and cost of stationery for examinations and teaching purposes and is known as the School Service Fee.

Cricket was of a high standard. The 14A, captained by Michael McLeod and coached by Mr. Banner, completed the season undefeated, and Mr. Hearn's 15B team is assured of winning its grade. All three 14-year teams, at this stage, are in winning positions.
