The Principal's Message

THE SIGNIFICANCE OF OUR AMERICAN STUDENT

Occasionally at Ryde High a feeling of isolation overtakes us; on such occasions perhaps we realise we are miles from the nearest railway stations or not close to the main business centres and dependent on a restricted bus service. But we can't afford to allow our geographical position or Ryde's earlier isolation to affect our thoughts and sympathies.

Early this year the calamitous bush fires took us very close to distant Tasmania and opened our hearts to the sufferers.

With the enrolment this year of our first American Field Service Scholarship Student, came an interest and a link with overseas. Kathy Schultz comes from Bay Village, Ohio, U.S.A. and her recent presentation to this school of the national

flag which had flown over the Capitol, Washington, directs our attention to the Australian-American Association and its ideal of better international understanding and goodwill.

Ryde High, despite its youth, is growing up. Only eight years ago, it was merely a small group of first year pupils housed at another high school and, of course, these pupils did not reach fifth year status until 1963. Two years later 128 completed the five-year course and sat for the Leaving Certificate Examination.

To-day, its more mature students, with their many interests, indicate a wider approach to life and its problems. Our younger school citizens are furthering their education by the experience of direct contact with a fine overseas student.

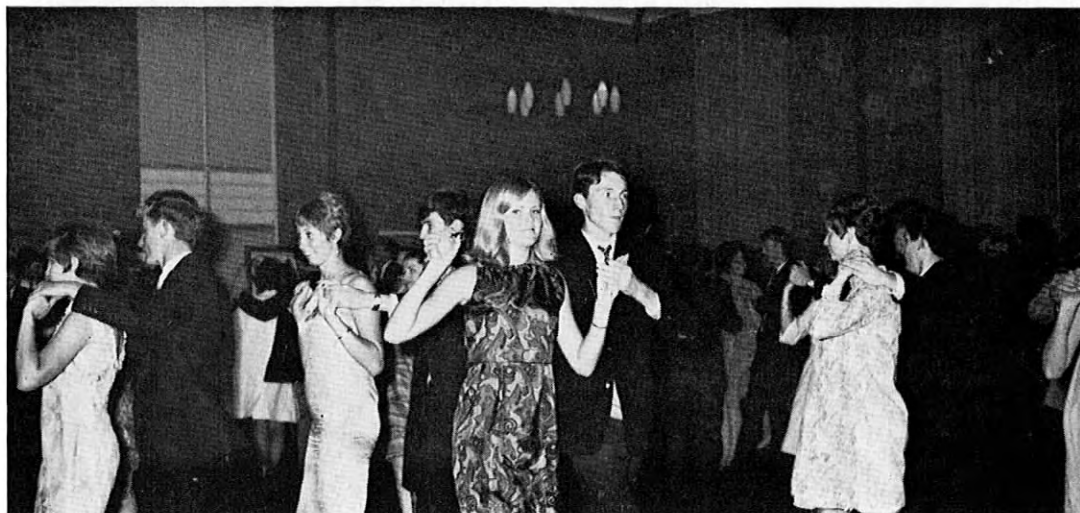

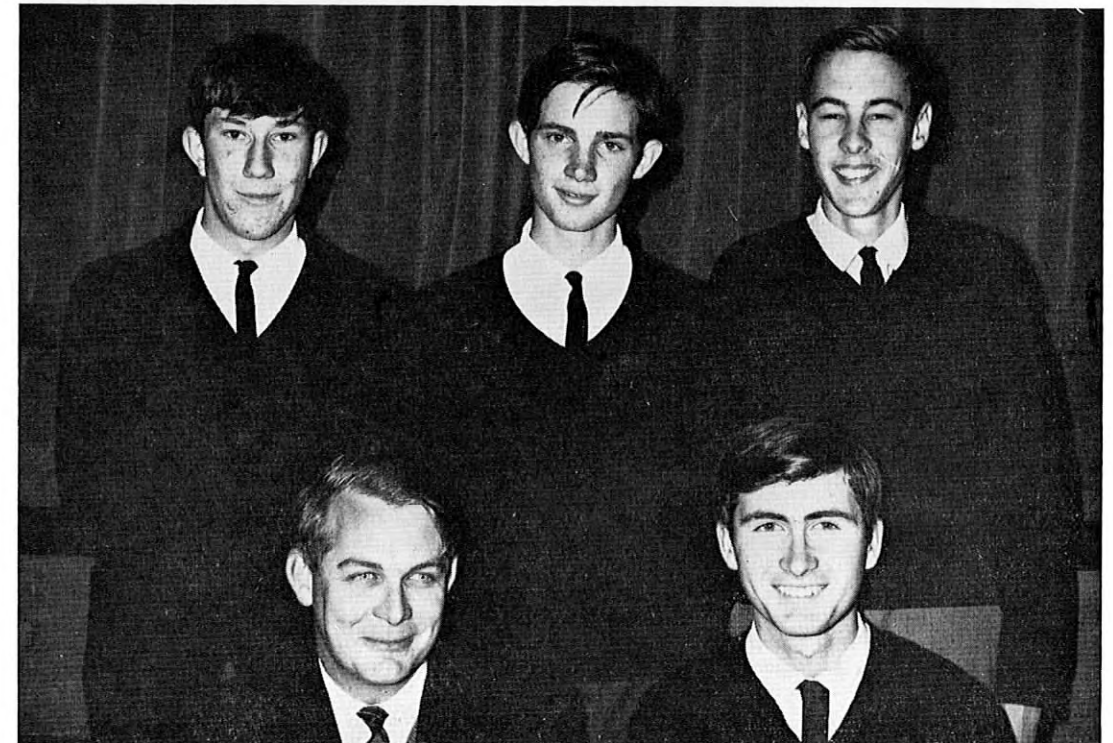
EXCURSIONS

OUR AMERICAN EXCHANGE STUDENT

To write a description of my year as a host sister to an American Field Service Exchange Student is an extremely difficult task, as so many events have taken place, that it would be impossible to tell of each one. However, I wish to tell of the more important ones.

My first meeting with Kathy was on January 21, when the temperature in Sydney was 104 degrees, compared with 5 below zero, which Kathy had experienced in Bay Village, Ohio, on her departure. As there were twenty-five Field Service students arriving, there were many "new" families anxiously waiting at the airport, with brightly coloured banners of greeting.

My family and I were fortunate to have Kathy Schultz stay with us. Family life was a bit different for her to begin with, as she was used to having three sisters around the house, and her father travels a great deal so that he was not often at home. In her new home she had only one sister, and a dad who was not always travelling.

Kathy and I have had many experiences together throughout the year which, I am sure, neither of us will forget. We have attended many important functions and parties, and have travelled nearly all over N.S.W. The trips we remember most were a Geography excursion to the Snowy Mountains, and a weekend spent at Mudgee, where we went gold panning, and actually found a few small pieces.

During Kathy's stay, there have been many humorous incidents, one of which I remember particularly well. It happened during our visit to town, as the train stopped at Central Station, a sailor boarded the train in his usual uniform. Kathy's immediate remark was "Gee that sailor musn't have had time to press his pants before he left!"

As American Field Service is not as well known in Australia as in many other countries, Kathy has been asked to give numerous speeches and slide evenings to local organisations, as well as the P. & C. Ladies' Auxiliary and other High Schools in the area. She also spoke to the Australian students who left in July to spend a year in the U.S.

Although there have been many outside activities which have taken up almost every weekend, Kathy's main interest has been in her school life as it was here that she really got to know the Australian people of her own age, and their differences and similarities.

As January draws nearer and nearer, I realise how busy we both have been, and the year has simply sped by, yet there are so many things that must be done in a limited time. When she does return there will be many memories for Kathy — her Australian family and friends; the beaches; meat pies and passionfruit; but I'm sure she will miss these things no more than we will miss her.

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC

Many pupils at this School are given the opportunity to study a wide variety of musical instruments. At the present moment, all sections of the string group (violin, viola, 'cello and double basses) are being taught. In the woodwind section we have classes for clarinet, flute, oboe and bassoon. The brass section consists mainly of trumpet players, but there are now two boys learning the French Horn, two the mellaphone and four other boys the trombone.

Each student is given at least one lesson (in class) each week, and besides this, when proficient, becomes a member of the School Band and/or Orchestra.

Prior to 1965, there were only a mere handful of children learning any orchestral instrument. Now the Orchestra has at least forty players. The School Band consists of four brass and woodwind players.

Small Ensemble Groups have been arranged with the view to mixing the various instruments — also to give the pleasure that only those participating know and feel.

This year, an evening of Instrumental Music was given to raise funds for new instruments, which will be needed next year for the First Form children who wish to learn. Every child participated in some way — nearly all items being in group form.

The Orchestra and Band had a Guest Conductor, Mr. Burtenshaw, who was the former Music Master. It was by his efforts that so many instruments were acquired, either from the Department itself, or through the Parents and Citizens' Committee.

In addition to Orchestral Instruments studied, Ryde High also has a Recorder Group, started at the end of last year, and now has at least 16 members. This enthusiastic section does very good work in the very little time it has for practice, before school each morning.

Another small group that has been commenced is one for Chanters. This, we hope, will become the future Ryde High Pipe Band.

Students learning the flute, clarinet, violin and French horn, sat for examinations at the Conservatorium (A.M.E.B.), and last year, all those who entered passed with very good results. This year, again, we have entries for these examinations, which will be completed in the Third School Term.

Learning to play these instruments is a pleasant hobby, but it may also form part of the examination subject of Music. What was commenced purely as a hobby, may become something of far greater importance in the future.

REPORT ON GEOGRAPHY FIELD EXCURSIONS, 1966-7

Since November, 1966, a series of four geography excursions have been conducted for Fifth and Sixth Form pupils, without serious loss of life or injury to either staff or pupils. Under the Wyndham Scheme students are required to participate in five such excursions during their senior years. The aims of such field work being to—

- (a) establish comprehension of:
 - i. major patterns in the natural environment;
 - ii. major patterns of agricultural, manufacturing and town development;
 - iii. regional character.
- (b) establish sensible and sympathetic attitudes towards geographic problems;
- (c) develop skills in observation and recording.

Whilst these are the general aims of the whole geography course in senior or forms, field work allows us to make some attempt to satisfy these aims, in areas that are close to the school.

Brief details of the field work undertaken are as follows: November, 1966 and May, 1967 — examination of coastal landform features, vegetation successions in coastal lagoons, urban settlement in Warringah Shire. Industrial location and agricultural land use were also studied in this area. Of particular interest was the visit to the Hydraulic Research Station of the University of N.S.W. We would like to express our thanks to Associate Professor Hattersley, who made the visit possible.

May, 1967 — a trip to Newcastle and Hexham to observe the difference between simple and complex manufacturing and also the different factors influencing the location of such industry.

August, 1967 — a three day jaunt to the Snowy Mountains — to observe the Snowy Mountains Hydro Electric Scheme — not only was this of general interest as a great engineering feat of world significance, but also an example of how man may alter the water cycle of nature.

One may be starting to get the impression that geography field work is a rather dreary process, lacking both interest and challenge. Geography may be defined as 'the science of the present' and we concentrate on the surface of the Earth. Obviously, the best way to study geography is to get out and look at the countryside. In the course of such observation, humorous and/or adventurous incidents are likely to arise. Whilst our 'excursions' have been 'adventure-free', other schools have been less fortunate . . . like the pupil who was so absorbed in studying the rock platform at a northern beach that he did not see the large wave . . . and the lady teacher who insisted that the Hole in the Wall at Avalon could be reached by walking around the rocks from a nearby beach — unfortunately the sea was rough and it was raining, the rocks were slippery and her male colleague was seen to slither. Bus trips always lend a little excitement, if not danger to field work, roads are invariably too rough, too muddy or too steep and winding . . . as at Newport Plateau. Train trips are without fail, cold, uncomfortable, noisy . . . sleepless! Snow is usually white, cold, damp and thrown!

Throughout all these excursions, the behaviour of Ryde High pupils has been excellent. We complement the Senior Geography pupils and feel that the rest of the school can be proud of them.

If pupils have gained an appreciation not only of the beauty of this world we live in but also the patterns formed by natural and/or cultural features of its surface, then we are satisfied.

RULES FOR THE AWARDING OF BLUES AND COMPOSITE BLUES

Blues

1. Where performances warrant, Blues may be awarded for the following sports: cricket, rugby, soccer, tennis, athletics, swimming, baseball, hockey, basketball, softball, water polo, volleyball (girls).
2. No more than two Blues shall be awarded, in any one year, in a particular sport.
3. No more than eight Blues (apart from Composite Blues) shall be awarded for boys' sport.
4. No more than eight Blues (apart from Composite Blues) shall be awarded for girls' sport.
5. Nominations for Blues in a particular sport shall be made by a committee consisting of the teacher in charge and the captain of that sport, and the Sportsmaster for boys sport and the Sportsmistress for girls' sport. The Sportsmaster or Sportsmistress may appoint another teacher to act for him or her on such committee.

Each nomination shall be accompanied by a statement of averages and/or performances

against other schools or teams.

6. Nominees shall have represented the School in senior competition. Students below Form Three at time of nominations are ineligible for nomination.

Composite Blues

7. Where performances warrant, Composite Blues may be awarded to a maximum of two for boys' sport and two for girls' sport.
8. A nominee for a Composite Blue shall (or in the opinion of the Blues Committee could) have represented the School in senior competition in at least four sports for boys or three sports for girls and shall have achieved a standard approaching that required for an individual Blue in at least two of these four (or three).
9. After consideration of the award of individual Blues, the Blues Committee may then make and consider nominations for the award of Composite Blues.

Awarding Bodies

10. The award of Blues and Composite Blues for girls' sport shall be made by the Girl's Blues Committee which shall consist of the Principal, Deputy Principal, Sportsmistress, teacher-in-charge of each sport or her deputy, and four student representatives elected from and by the captains of the sports teams, and a representative of the Masters.
11. The award of Blues and Composite Blues for Boys' sport shall be made by the Boys' Blues Committee which shall comprise the Principal, Deputy Principal, Sportsmaster, teacher-in-charge of each sport, or his deputy, a representative of the Masters and four student representatives elected from, and by the captains of the sports teams.
12. At least one day's notice shall be given of meetings for the award of Blues.

GIRLS' PHYSICAL EDUCATION REPORT, 1967

With the reformation of the Zone from the beginning of 1967, an increased number of students were given the opportunity to participate in a greater variety of inter-school sports.

For the first time, grade Volleyball and Softball competitions were introduced in the summer season, while two additional grade teams were added to the Basketball and Softball competitions during the winter season.

The greatly reduced time needed to travel to the schools in the area and the compactness of the Zone has meant that the time for each grade match has been increased to allow maximum use of all sporting facilities this year.

The introduction of a uniform First Form sport session throughout the Zone has meant that these pupils have had the advantage of coaching in swimming, life-saving, softball, basketball and hockey, and as well they have had opportunities to gain match experience against the first form students while playing non-competitive matches during the year. The practice of playing against the other schools has proved a good incentive for these students in their first year at High School, and they have developed a keen team spirit which should stand them in good stead for their entry into competition sport in 1968.

With smaller numbers of schools it was possible to have three entries in track events and two entries in field events. As well, additional events were included in the programme and the two

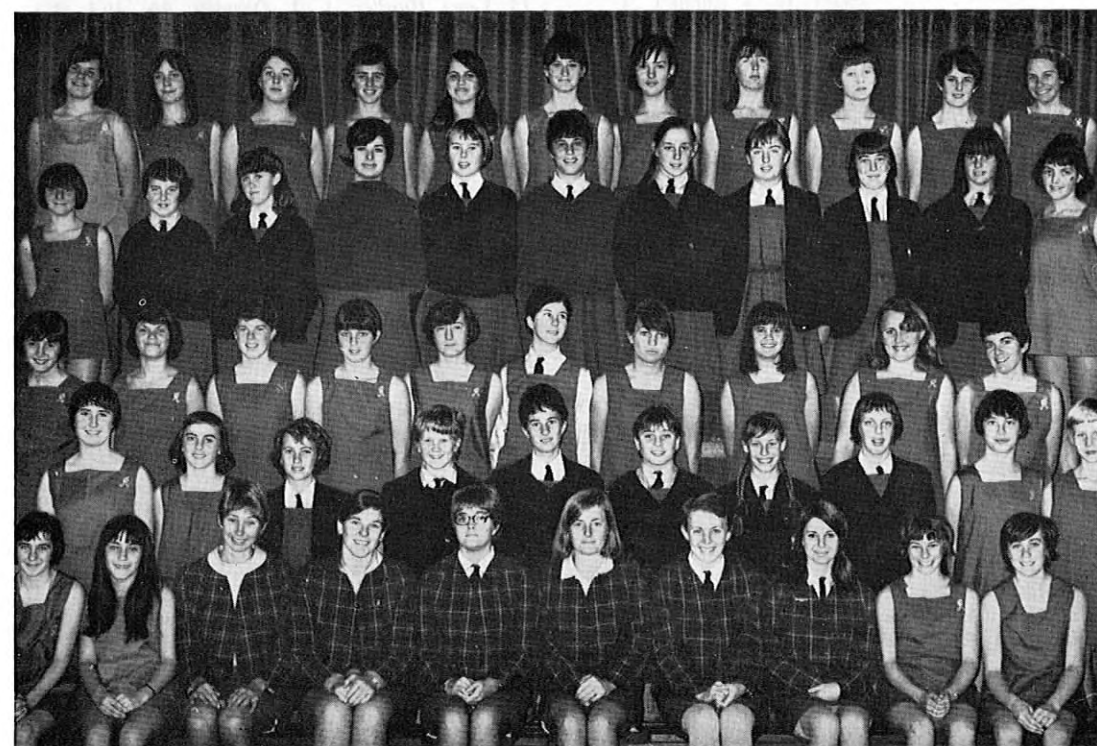
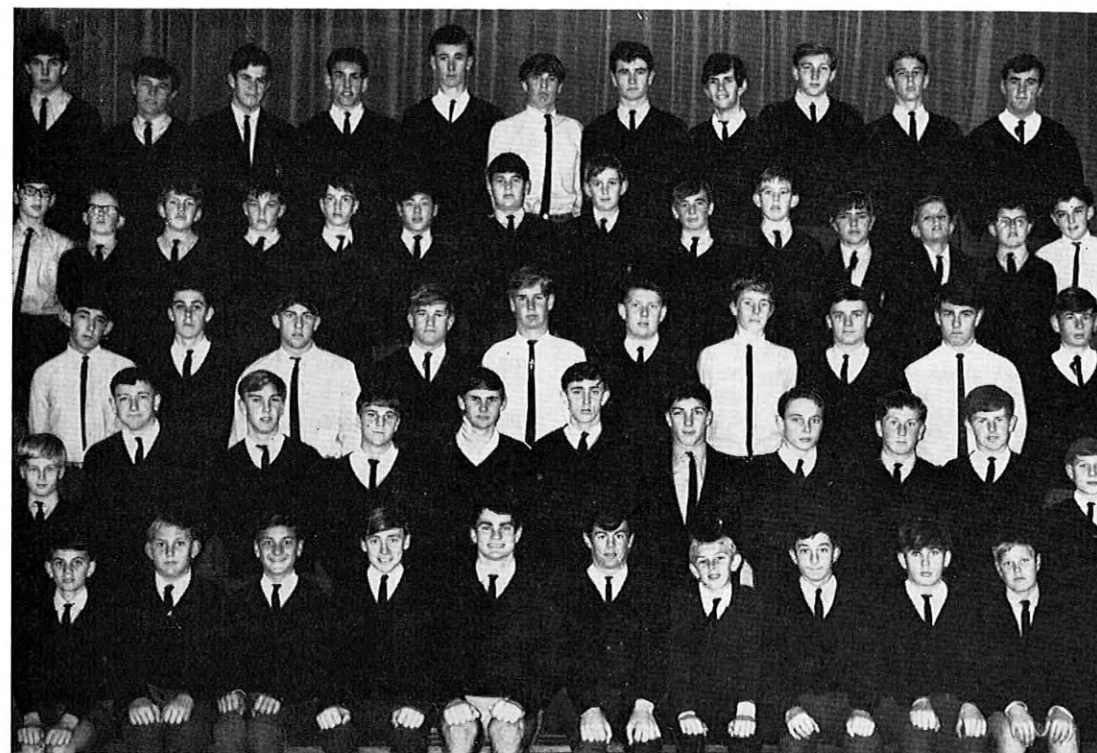
