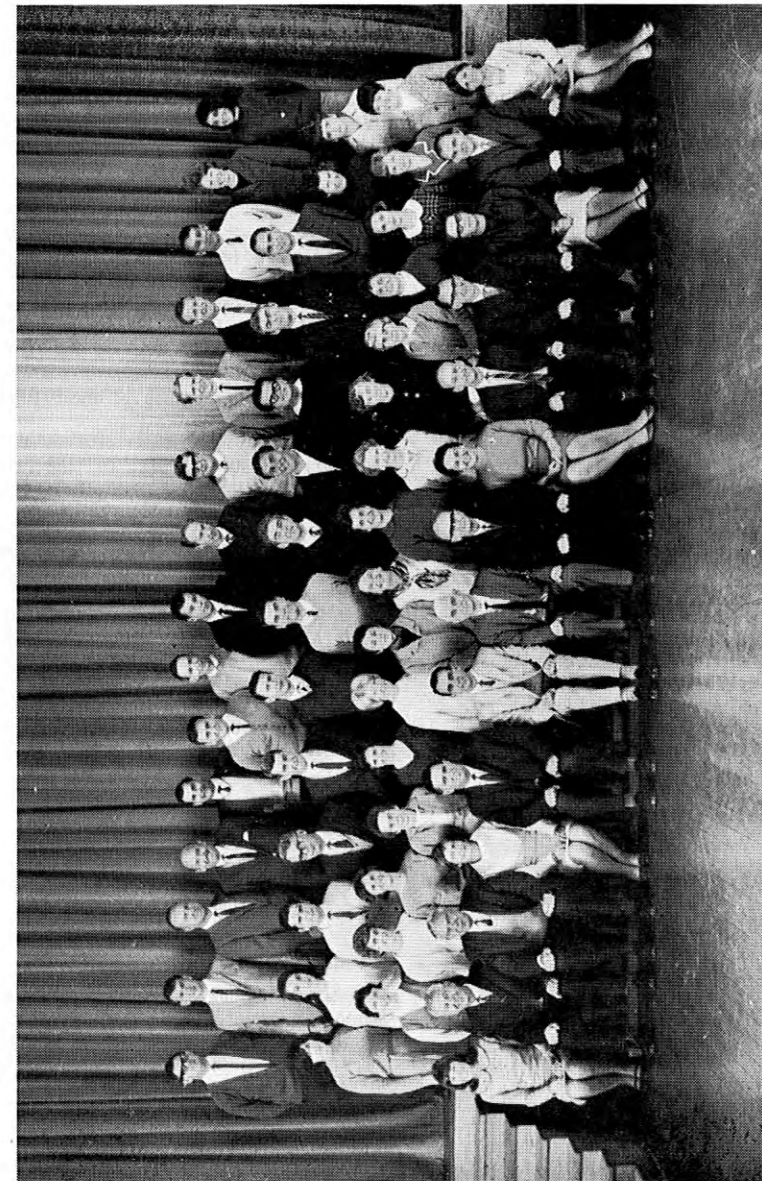

## Headmaster's Message

### RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

This year we have heard more than the usual reference to human rights, and from probably the more immature members of our school community, even some mention of "our rights".

The more mature students exercise their rights without saying much about them because they realise that for every right or privilege there is a corresponding obligation or responsibility. The right to walk on a footpath or drive a car on a road is associated with certain rules or obligations. The right to own a piece of property does not allow us to do just what we like with it. Freedom to express oneself in writing is another right but it cannot be abused; it must make allowance for the feelings and rights of others.

Most students with a sense of proportion accept these rights in their stride, understand the restrictions or responsibilities associated with them and thereby show just how mature they are, despite their youth.

For some students these rights and freedoms are new experiences and a minority have difficulty using the privileges whilst at the same time making allowances for the rights of others. Normally we are members of a group; our education proceeds within the social group and step by step conforms to the rules of the social group or

what is known as society. A feature of these rules is consideration for others. Do not our own school rules stress consideration for the rights of others?

Lately, we have heard much about Human Rights, because on December 10th 1948 the General Assembly of the United Nations adopted and proclaimed the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Therefore about this time this year we are celebrating the twentieth anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

The second last article of these Rights is worthy of our attention. It states:—

"Everyone has duties to the community in which alone the free and full development of his personality is possible.

In the exercise of his rights and freedoms, everyone shall be subject only to such limitations as are determined by law solely for the purpose of securing *due recognition and respect for the rights and freedoms of others* and of meeting the just requirements of morality, public order and the general welfare in a democratic society."

I cannot think of any right that does not involve some duty or responsibility. Can you?

## EDITORIAL

Not only have many students been successful in academic and sporting activities but also they have participated in a wide range of social and community affairs this year.

**CAPTAIN'S MESSAGE**

Sometimes it can appear that High School education is no more than a harsh and bitter struggle to gain examination passes, the sole motive being to receive the qualifications for a particular occupation and then to enter the fierce competition of the outside world.

Of course the existence of this competition, and the examination system is an unfortunate reality of our school life, but it would be a mistake to say that this was the only, or even the most, important aspect of education. In our High School years we are learning to act carefully and maturely on the basis of our knowledge. We are encouraged to think individually and to clearly express and exchange ideas. In this way, we are preparing to take our place as adults in the community — not as mindless cogs in a machine, but as thinking individuals, ready to contribute to the solving of society's many problems. At High School, we are probably experiencing the most decisive years of our lives.

So although we may have little practical need for much of the knowledge we acquire at school (an engineer for instance, would seem to have small use for a knowledge of Latin) what we learn should provoke within us an ability to reason logically, and a desire to gain more knowledge. The learning processes we begin at school should remain and develop with us for the rest of our lives.

For this reason, education attempts to offer the student a diversity of subjects and activities. Obviously the reality falls far short of the ideal, but such external activities as debating, the many school clubs (the Chess and Camera clubs are prominent examples) and the various sports available, all help to make school more than a mere factory that produces successful candidates.

For six years now, my fellow sixth-formers and myself have been a part of Ryde High, and what we have learnt and experienced here, will make a permanent impression on our lives. We have been fortunate in having teachers who have always been ready to help and advise us, and I know I speak for all of the Sixth form when I thank these teachers, particularly those of our final two years. Ryde High has always been a school with a high standard, and I am sure that this will be maintained by the students in the years to come, for it is a standard which enjoys not only high examination successes, but more essentially, a sound preparation for a constructive position within society.

### THE LANGUAGE LABORATORY

At the beginning of 1968, Ryde High School was one of four High Schools in the Metropolitan Area to have a Language Laboratory installed by the Department of Education. The Laboratory is provided with 30 booths, a console from which 3 programmes may be transmitted, individual microphones and earphones, and 6 small recorders designed for remedial work. Thus pupil and teacher can communicate without the rest of the class being interrupted.

The value of such a laboratory is immeasurable, but the first year of use can only be experimental. Time is needed to build up a suitable and effective

library of tape programmes, and this can only be done over a long period. But after even this short time, some very encouraging results have been noticed.

What a laboratory provides is individual work for the pupil that cannot be gained in the classroom; it enables the pupils to hear native speakers repeatedly; it allows for immediate correction in oral work; it helps in acquiring speed of utterance and authentic intonation. Above all it gives pupils more confidence in their approach to the spoken language.

## A NATION DOOMED TO DIE

Although Biafra hasn't appeared in the news  
much, it is the bloodiest and most gruesome battle  
ever fought. The Federal Nigerian troops have  
put the pressure on Biafra, so much, that the  
whole population is crammed into the territory  
called Ibo, a strip of land 40 miles wide.

The two rivals in this war are General Gowon of  
Nigeria and Colonel Ojukwu of Biafra. There are  
six million refugees in Ibo and six hundred  
thousand are believed to be starving to death. Biafra  
has long lost the war on military standards. Biafra's  
Capital, Enugu, has been long deserted and is  
regarded as a ghost town. Port Harcourt, which  
was to supply Biafra with economic self sufficiency  
has fallen to the forces of Nigeria. The so-called  
"Army of Biafra" is in tattered ruins. As one  
reporter says in a newspaper, "The six hundred  
men I saw in action had no field medical officers.  
The wounded had to make their own way back  
to the advance camp, where there was just one  
doctor with little more than some blood plasma  
and about one hundred shots of morphine."

The Biafrans wait in fear of a mass slaughter  
— a literal "kill". Indeed, many Nigerians are  
poised for the kill, because of alleged misdeeds  
and atrocities on both sides. The peace talks in  
London seem to have had little effect, both sides  
finding nothing to agree on. The Nigerians have in  
fact put up a blockade and are not allowing  
medicine or food to get through.

The leader of Biafra, Colonel Ojukwu, refuses  
to surrender unconditionally. This would mean the  
civil war, bloodshed and atrocities would have been  
fought for nothing. If this is independence, is it  
worth fighting for?

## CHORAL MUSIC ACTIVITIES

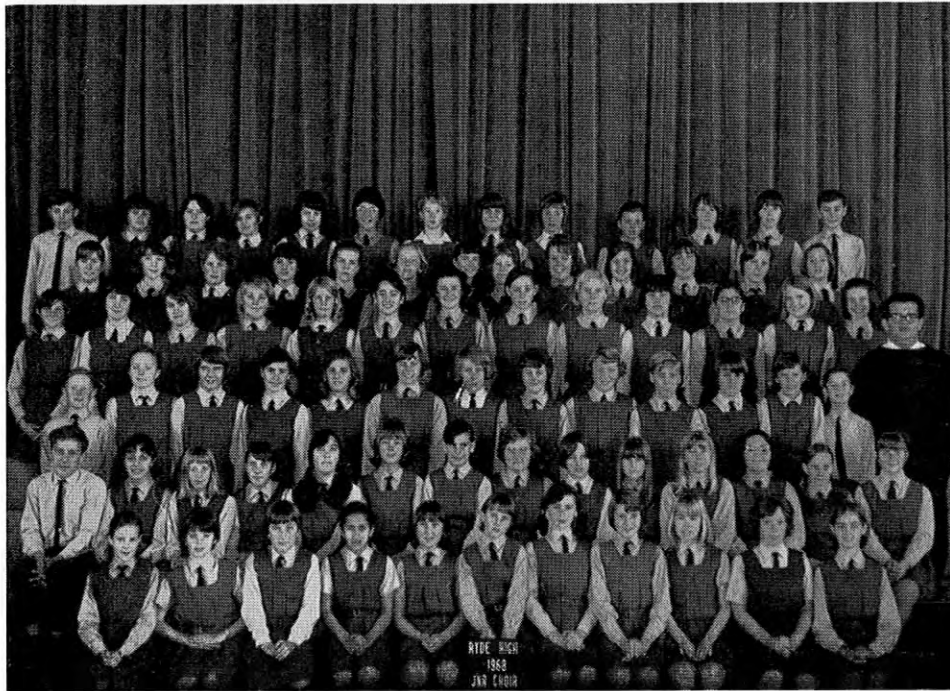

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## RULES FOR THE AWARDING OF BLUES AND COMPOSITE BLUES

### Blues

1. Where performances warrant, Blues may be awarded for the following sports: cricket, rugby, soccer, tennis, athletics, swimming, baseball, hockey, basketball, softball, water polo, volley ball (girls).
2. No more than two Blues shall be awarded, in any one year, in a particular sport.
3. No more than ten Blues (apart from Composite Blues) shall be awarded for boys' sport.
4. No more than eight Blues (apart from Composite Blues) shall be awarded for girls' sport.
5. Nominations for Blues in a particular sport shall be made by a committee consisting of the teacher in charge and the captain of that sport, and the Sportsmaster for boys' sport and the Sportsmistress for girls' sport. The Sportsmaster or Sportsmistress may appoint another teacher to act for him or her on such committee. Each nomination shall be accompanied by a statement of averages and/or performances against other schools or teams.
6. Nominees shall have represented the School in senior competition. Students below Form Three at time of nominations are ineligible for nomination.

### Composite Blues

7. Where performances warrant, Composite Blues may be awarded to a maximum of two for boys' sport and two for girls' sport.
8. A nominee for a Composite Blue shall (or in the opinion of the Blues Committee could) have represented the School in senior competition in at least four sports for boys or three sports for girls and shall have achieved a standard approaching that required for an individual Blue in at least two of these four (or three).
9. After consideration of the award of individual Blues, the Blues Committee may then make and consider nominations for the award of Composite Blues.

### GIRLS' PHYSICAL EDUCATION REPORT 1968

Although we have few outstanding individuals in the various sports fields this year, 1968 has been the most successful in all sporting activities in the School's life.

Perhaps the main reason for this has been the hard work and enthusiasm of students from first to sixth forms. They have always been willing to do just that "bit extra" that coaches have asked for throughout the year.

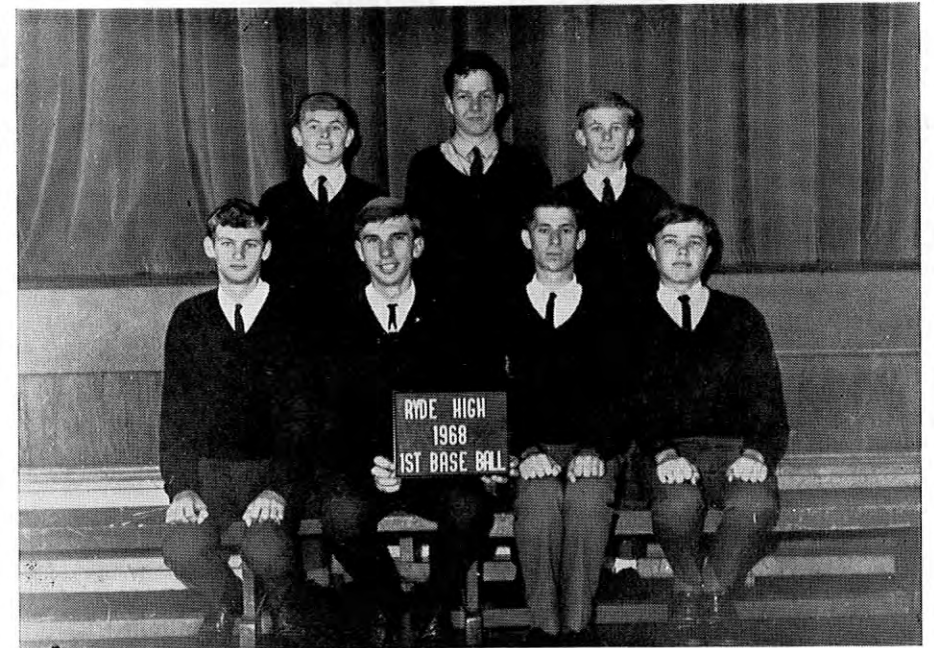
