From First Form to Sixth Form — from 12 years to 18 years — we have been at High School. After slowly climbing the ladder, we leave the School as adults. Society, I believe, does treat us as adults, since it bestows on us several important privileges which demand an adult approach. We are "freed" from displaying "P" plates, we are legally given the right to drink in public, and it seems likely that we will be given the franchise. But what actually has been responsible for helping us to develop to this stage of importance? Certainly, a large

part of the answer has been our experiences at School and influences acting within the School.

The Teaching Staff has definitely played a major role in our maturing process. For six years they have been our guides. Again, general school activities have exerted great influence. Fifth and Sixth Form students are responsible for the organization of certain social activities in the School agenda — such as the School Ball. Quite often, we are required to exercise our creative abilities, and sometimes even our mental capacity. Cultural pursuits are also included in our education and are therefore influential in our development. Being given a position of authority in the school is another significant influence. If we know that others are expecting us to carry out duties well, then we are more conscious of what we do and how we do it. This idea of respecting the wishes of others is extremely important in adulthood, as so much depends upon the way we decide to "get along" with others. A good example of this responsibility is the rostering of Prefects to Junior classes.

Well then, if we are to regard ourselves as adults and be considered by others as adults, what is actually expected of us, and how are we to handle this position? I am sure the answer lies in the way we, ourselves, "tackle" this problem, and surely the way we eventually do this must be the end result of the influence and training we receive during the years we attend School.

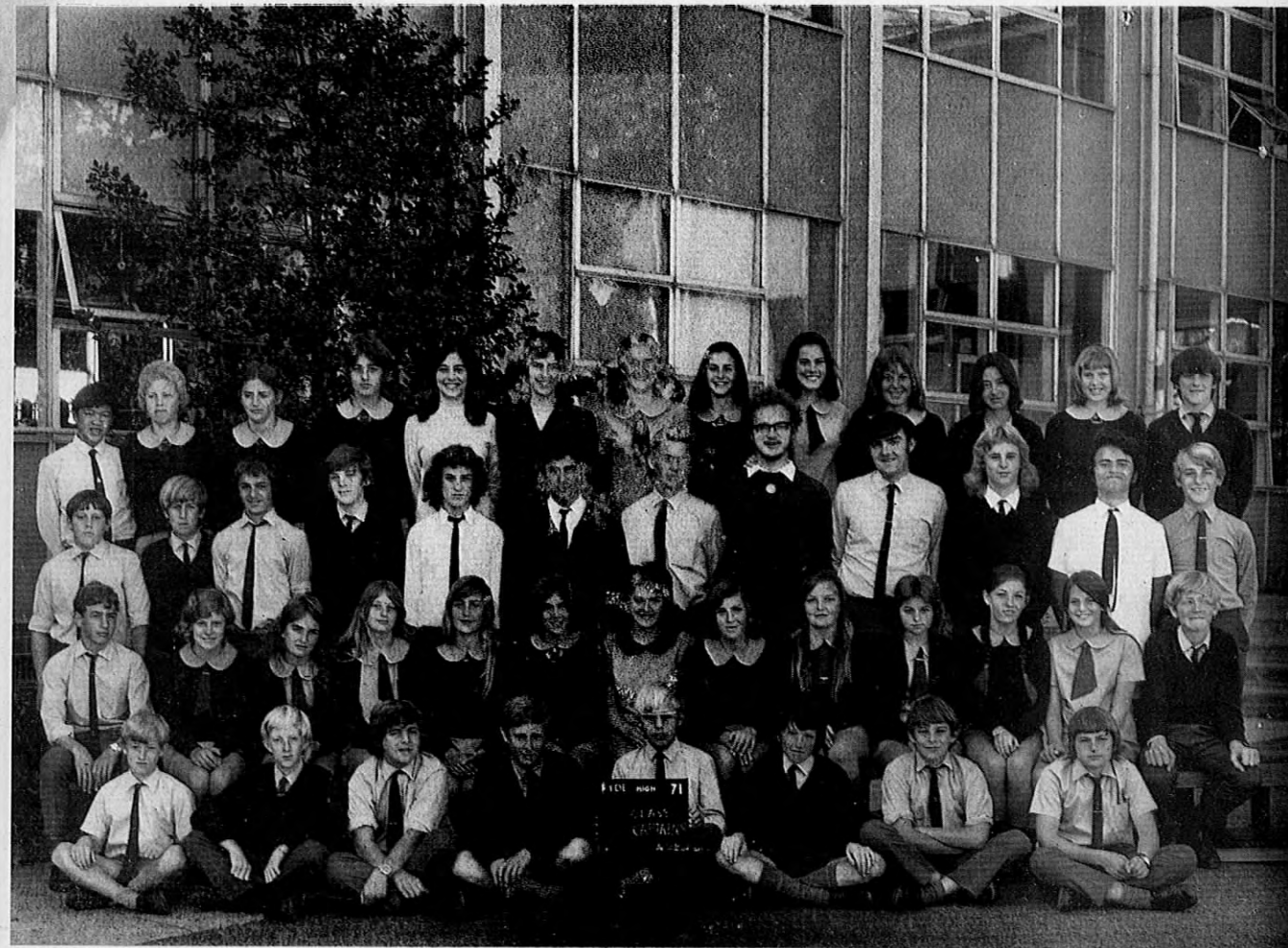

## The Students' Representative Council, 1971

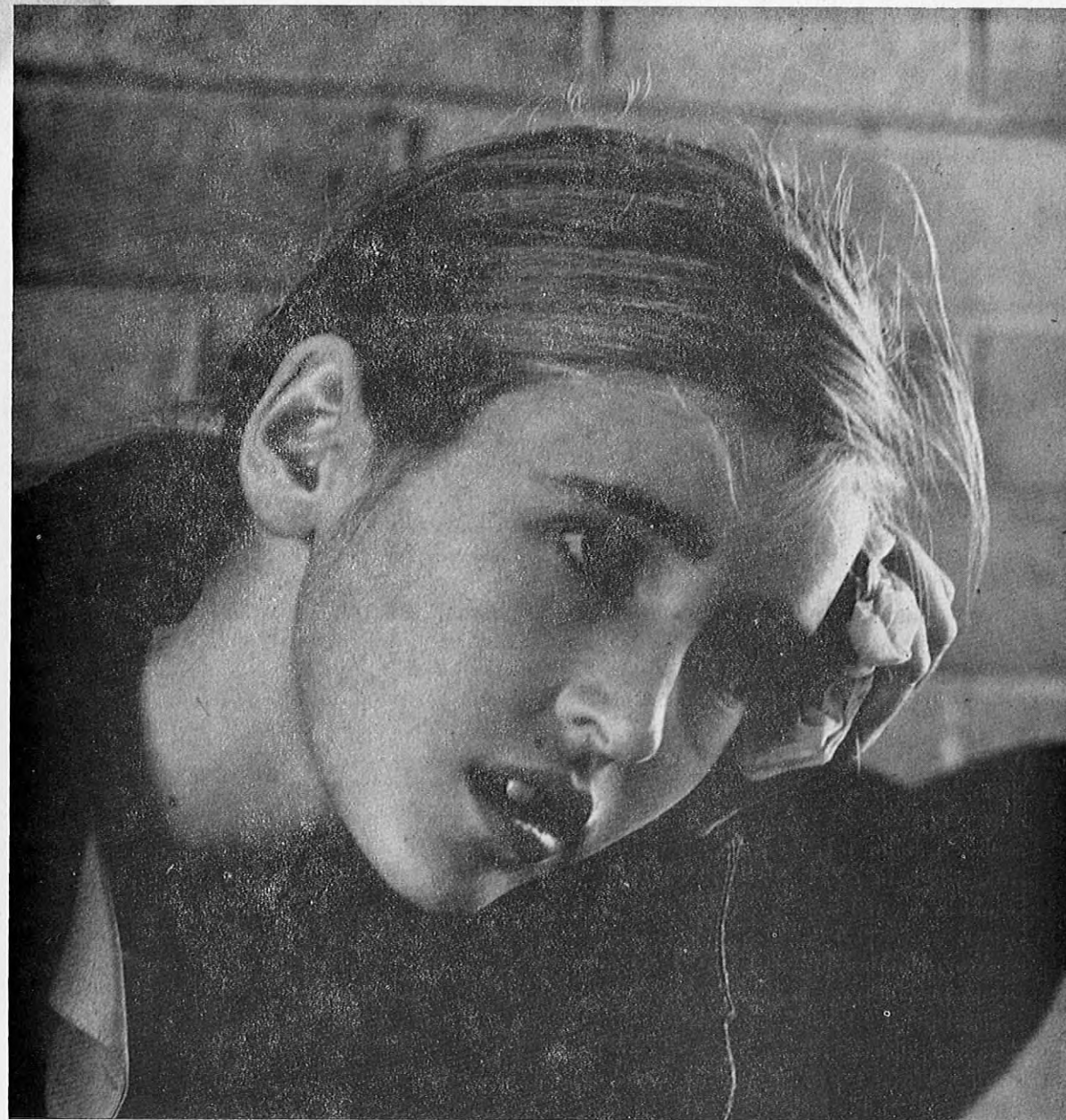
This year has marked the beginning of the first Students' Representative Council at Ryde High. The way was paved by many discussions between students and teachers during 1970, and was made possible by the sanction of our headmaster, Mr. McDonnell. The Council was finally formed in March this year, with the election by the students of their twenty-two representatives.

Basically, the aim of the Council is to give students the opportunity to show a greater responsibility towards their school by taking an active interest in school affairs and their own education. It serves as a forum for critical discussion of matters relating to the students, community affairs, and current topics of interest.

Since the Council's inception, we have been fortunate in receiving advice and support from Mrs. Bradley. Also, I must acknowledge the consistent efforts of some Council members, and especially our office-bearers, Anne Stewart (Secretary), Heather Trodden (Minutes Secretary) and Greg Robinson (Treasurer), in spite of the fact that there has been little spare time this year for sixth formers. These and other members have been the main force which led to the organisation of a successful social in May, the presentation of a petition for a change in the junior girl students' uniform, the extension of sixth form study time by the bringing forward of the non-compulsory sport date, and an investigation into the school bus situation. Of particular interest, was the arranged visit of Steering Committee representative, Mr. Tony Wiseheart, who discussed with us the need for the establishment of a Youth Centre in the Ryde district, and the problems facing its introduction. Also, exchange visits took place between Malvina High and Ryde High Schools for the purpose of observing other S.R.C. meeting procedures.

The last months have been experimental ones for the Council, and naturally we have had some problems. These problems, I hope, will be minimized as members fully realise the role and responsibilities of a councillor. Perhaps it might help if the Council had the power to co-opt new representatives to take the place of ones who have left. Also representatives will have to work harder to seek out the views of their electors on major issues and report on their behalf.

## TASMANIA -- May, 1971

Hosted by the N.S.W. Government Railways, forty-five keen travellers left Central on the "Southern Aurora" at 8.00 p.m. on Saturday, 15th May. For the first and last time for a week, we had plenty of time to catch our transport, which delivered us to Spencer Street Station in Melbourne at 9.00 a.m. after a rather sleepless night due to over-excitement and lack of air-conditioning.

Sunday was spent travelling through the Dandenong Ranges, just outside Melbourne, with an enjoyable afternoon visit to Healesville Animal Sanctuary, where the animals live in almost natural surroundings. After a rushed evening meal at the "Hotel Windsor," we hastily boarded the "Australian Trader" with about ten minutes to spare before sailing time.

After a very comfortable night, most presented themselves for some form of breakfast the following morning, though quite a few had taken tablets rather than run the risk of missing a meal! We reached Burnie at about 9.30 a.m. and a week of touring Tasmania, by coach, began. The scenery down the West Coast was remarkable — in turn resembling the English countryside, a tropical rain forest, and a rugged mountain range. Near Queenstown, famed for the mining of sulphur, virtually no vegetation was to be seen on bare, brown hills. Monday night was spent at Strahan on Macquarie Harbour, in hotels which had been left far behind in the march of progress.

Tuesday dawned cold and rainy for the trip across to Hobart through hydro-electricity country. Some found the sway of the back of the bus too much so soon after breakfast, and fresh air was hastily sought. During the afternoon, snow was visible on a far-distant mountain, but we found none near our bus route to the disappointment of many of the travellers. Our Hobart motel was reached about 6.00 p.m. and after dinner, the evening was spent searching Hobart for ever-elusive signs of life.

With a temperature of 47 degrees we set off on Wednesday through historic countryside, seeing Australia's oldest road bridge, built by convicts in 1823 at Richmond, to the famous ruined settlement of Port Arthur. (On an historical note — Here we learnt the reason for the poor condition of the apparently well-constructed buildings — when they were sold to the public in 1887, it was on the condition that they were to be pulled down to erase the memory of the infamous era). A couple of hours were spent in the area where we found Australia's third largest souvenir shop, before setting off again for Hobart via some very unusual geological structures, and the minutely detailed model of a Tudor village near the site of Hobart's future casino. A marvellous view of Hobart's night lights was to be seen after tea, from nearby Mt. Nelson.

The Huon Valley was our Thursday morning target, but heavy mist as late as 10.30 a.m. prevented us seeing anything far from the roadside. An inspection of an apple-packing shed was made, where we relieved the owner of many of his seemingly unblemished "rejects." Just outside Hobart most of the group climbed the 291-staired spiral staircase of the "Shot Tower," used originally in the late 1800's to make lead shot for ammunition. A shopping expedition resulted in our being let loose on an unsuspecting Hobart, that afternoon, but nobody actually got lost and the time was spent in varying ways; e.g., a visit to Hobart's Art Gallery and Museum, in the process of being enlarged.

After hastily packing on Friday morning, we said farewell to the motel (probably much to the relief of the proprietor) and stopped just north of Hobart to visit the Cadbury-Fry-Pascall confectionery factory. Full marks to anyone who emerged, after being surrounded by vats of chocolate and slabs of sweet mixture, feeling able to eat the contents of their little sample box! We passed through gently undulating country on the way to Launceston, and saw a few more historical monuments; e.g., Ross Bridge, and Entally House, before reaching Tasmania's second largest city about 4.30 p.m. A Victorian girls' school, staying in our hotel, created a seemingly more than welcome diversion that evening, for many of the male members of the party!

The following morning before leaving Launceston we visited the mile-long Cataract Gorge and the wild life sanctuary. A short afternoon stop was made, during which Mr. Spence and our driver proved their worth as photographers, so group photos could be taken. Devonport airport witnessed the sad reluctant farewell to our driver, who assured us he had enjoyed the week spent in our company (?).

Central was reached safely at 9.00 a.m. on Sunday, 23rd May, and forty-five exhausted and not-so-keen travellers emerged from a thoroughly enjoyable trip. A re-union a fortnight later revealed many interesting scenes and experiences which won't be forgotten easily.

Many thanks to Mr. Spence and his family for "doing the right thing by their mates" and putting up with all of us and all the noise.

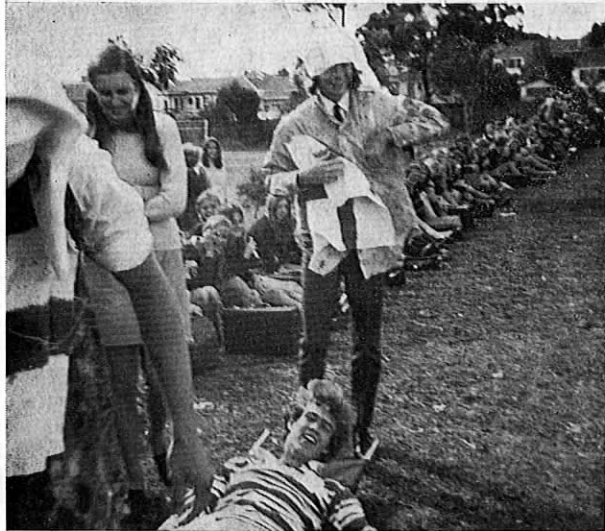

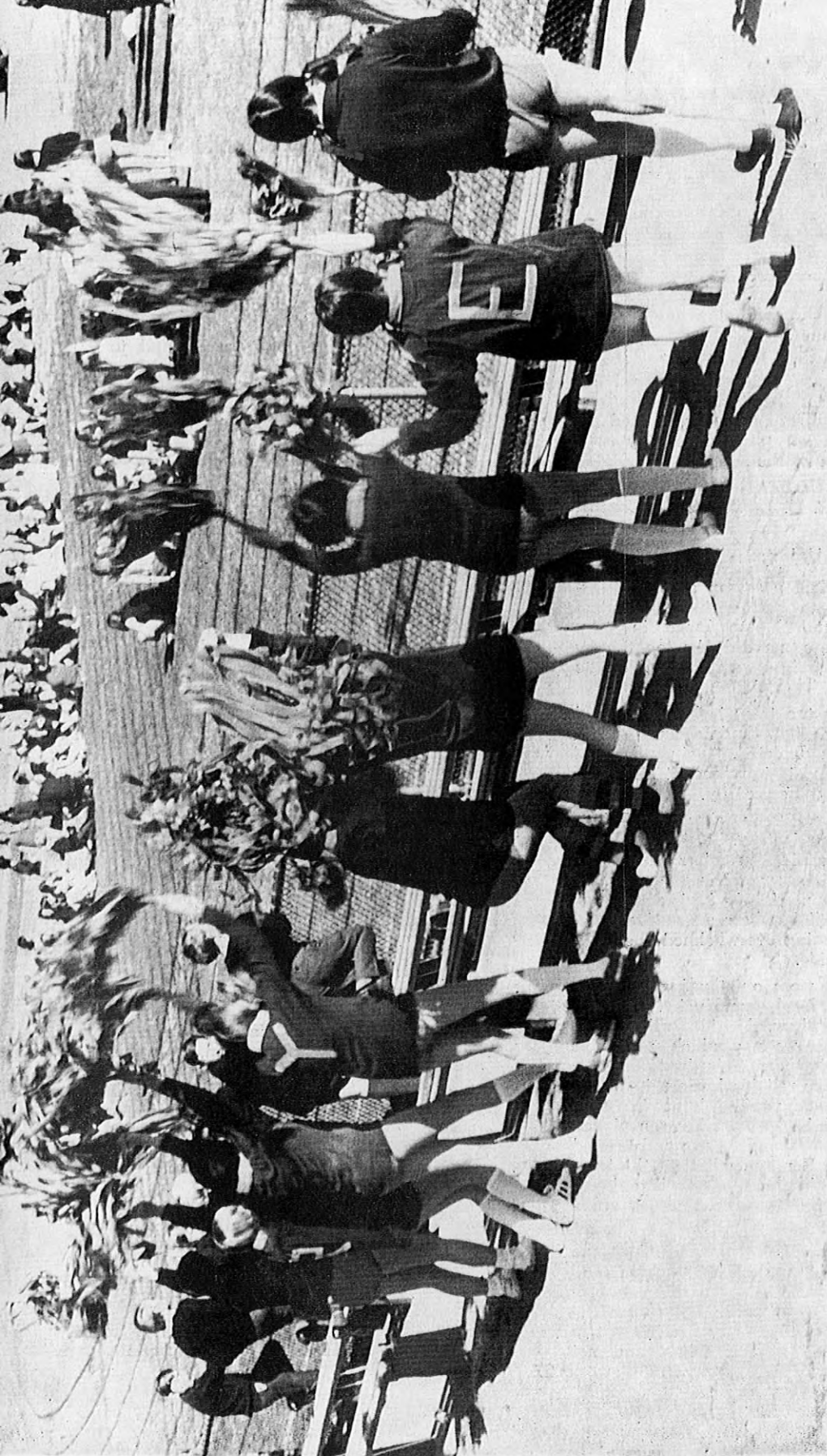
### 15A Water Polo:

## Athletics -- 1971

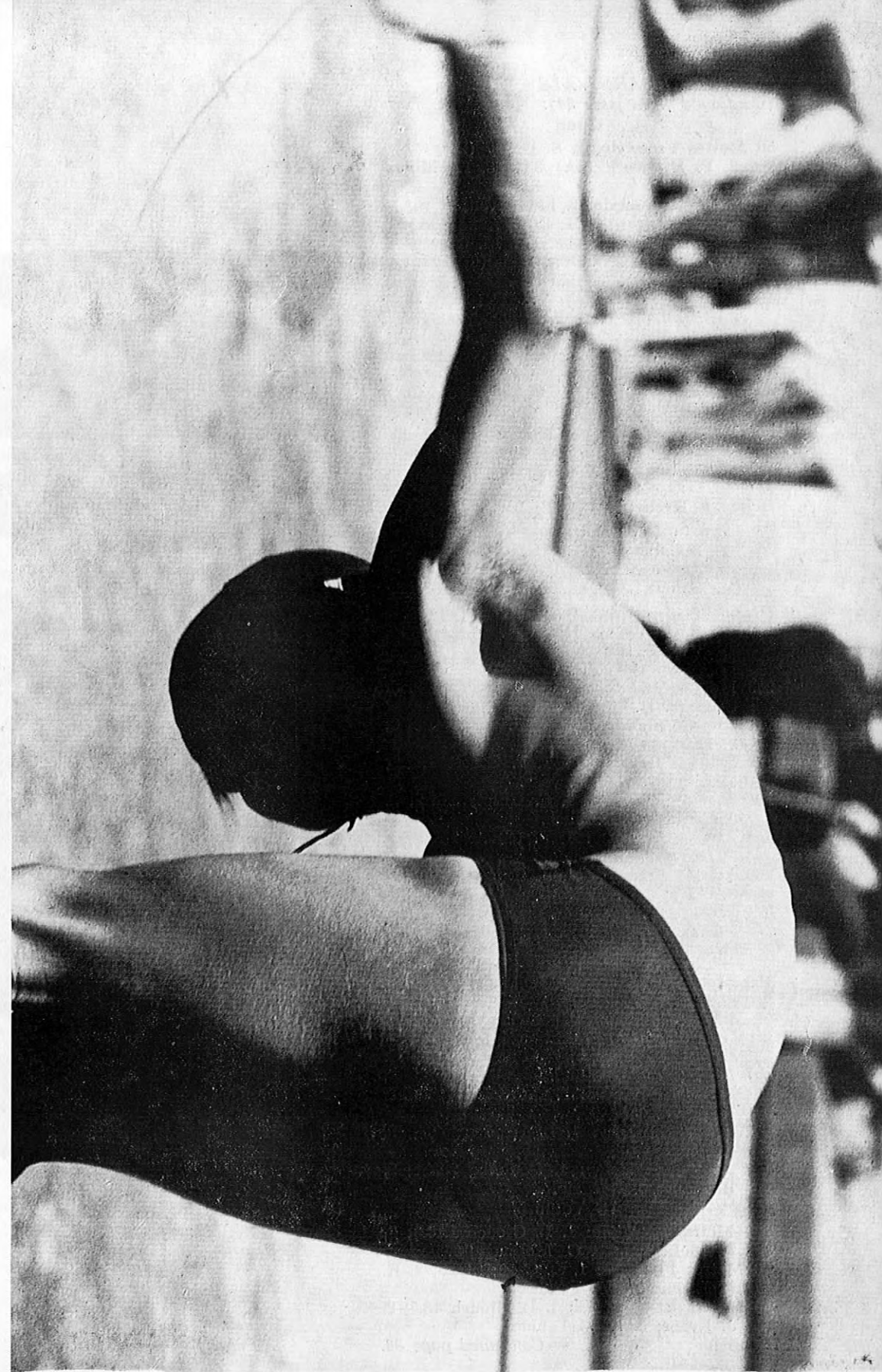

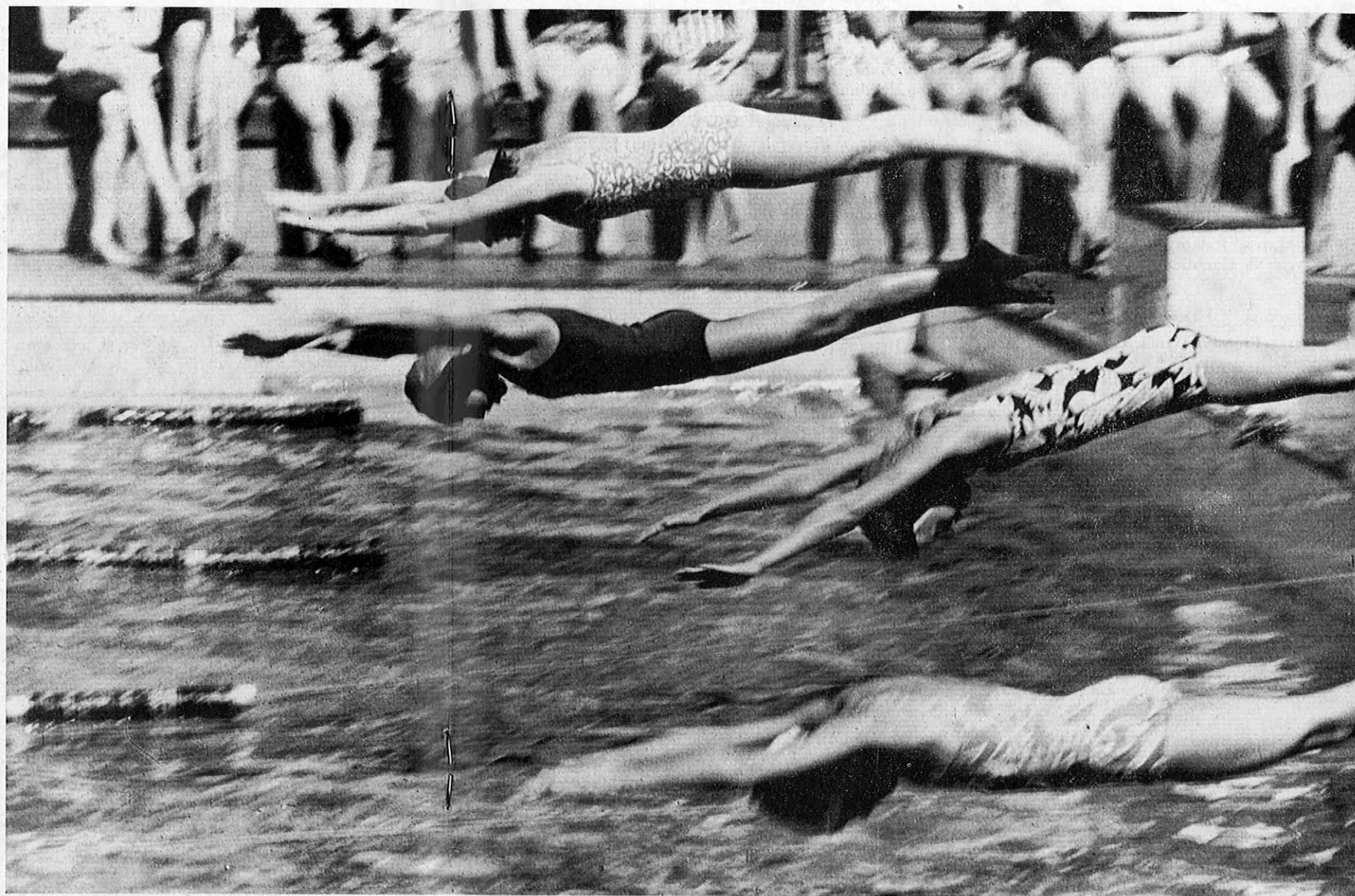

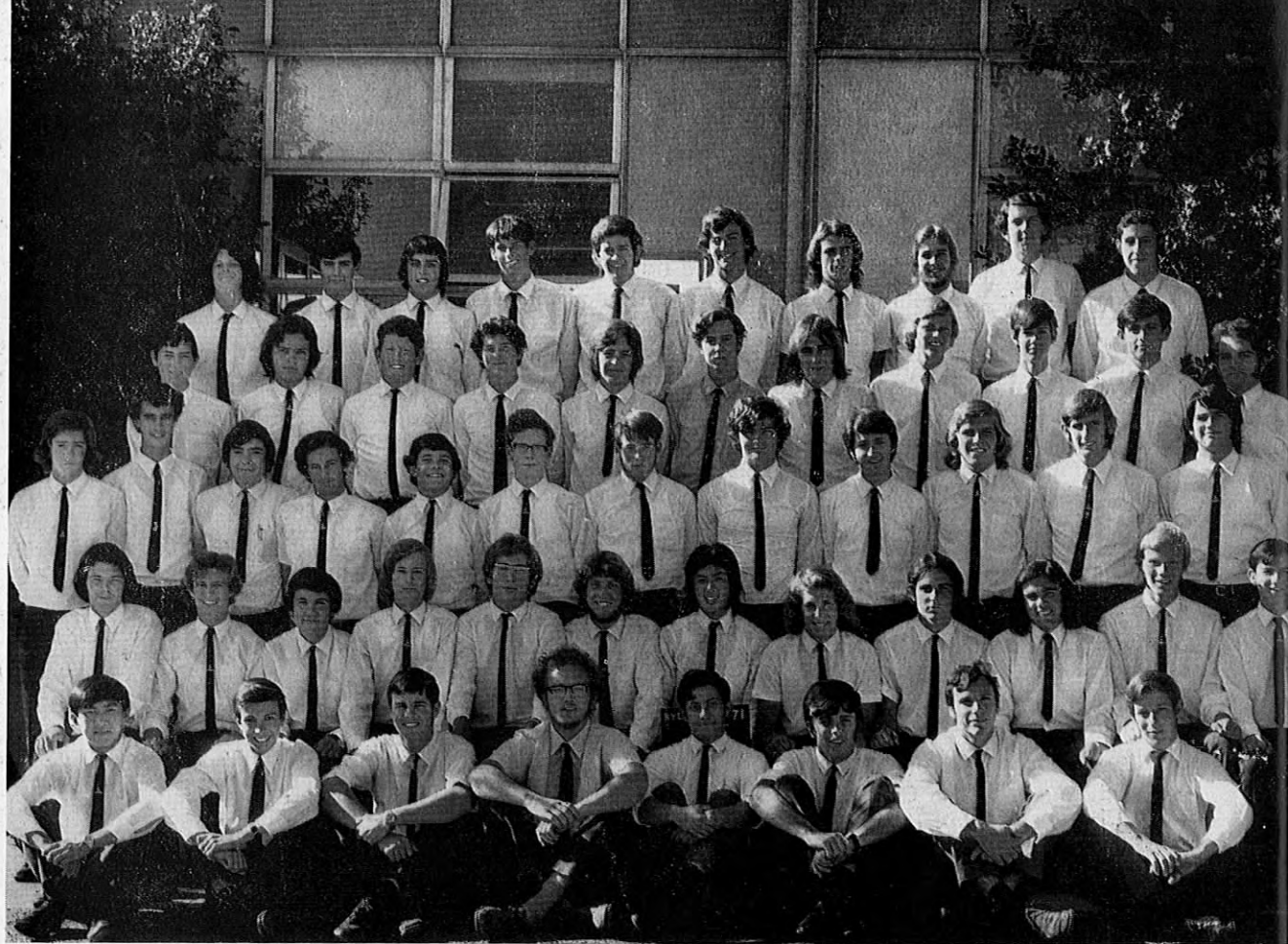

Mothers who are not yet Auxiliary members make a special effort to come and join us and enjoy yourselves.

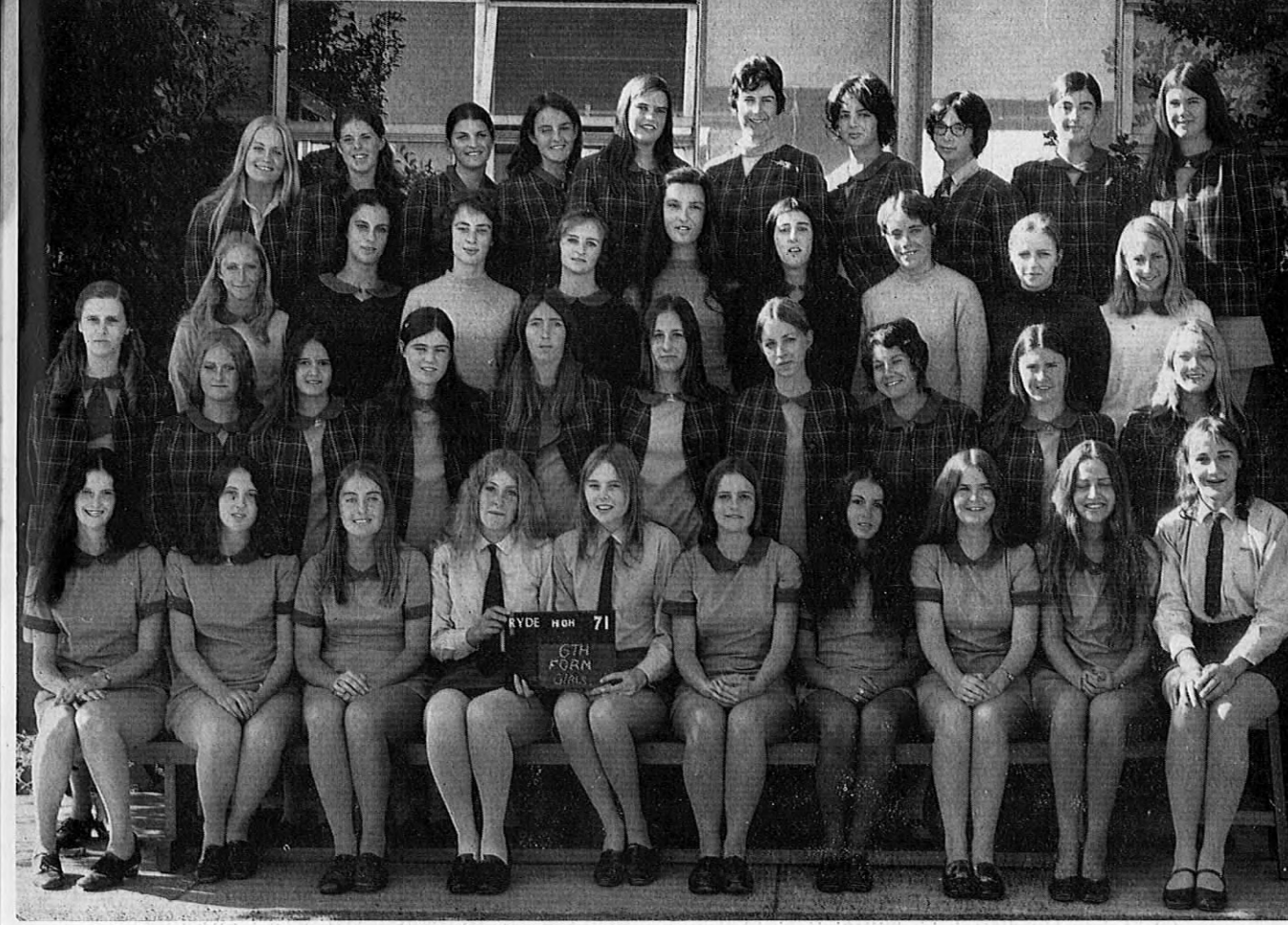
