Headmaster's Message

THOUGHTS FROM THE QUADRANGLE

Apart from the introduction of queer hair styles by some boys and requests for variations of uniform by girls there has not been a great deal of evidence of unusual behaviour by the bulk of the student population. Of course, the way they dance is quite strange to some of us, but may be all three variations are part of the changing fashions.

It appears students are not as dependent on home life as their parents were and consequently more independent. But to day just how dependent on home life are most of to-day's parents?

Our students are quite capable of thinking for themselves and on a few eccasions some sections of the school have expressed themselves by making requests but, the student body in general has been commendably restrained.

Some fifteen year old girls certainly broke new ground when they appealed for the inclusion of sex education in their Health Education Course.

In the realm of self government only one student, over a number of years, advocated a forum or council for the expression of student opinion and then only with a spasmodic and unimpressive approach. In September over forty Fifth Formers, following some encouragement, made approaches for the formation of a student's representative council to discuss matters that directly affect students. It is not intended that this Council displace the prefect-body, which is drawn from only Form 6, but represent a much wider range of pupils. Admittedly all rules and arrangements should be examined periodically in case changes are advisable. Constructive criticism properly presented should not be discouraged. If changes are inadvisable the examiners gain from the critical examination.

To-day's youth faces much publicity and more than a fair share of adverse criticism. The generation gap is stressed but records show that even one thousand years ago many of the older generation could not understand the behaviour or the interests of the youth of the day.

Modern youth are able to think for themselves; they possess initiative and are less dependent on their elders. They constitute a considerable proportion of the population but in many communities their peer-group needs are discounted or overlooked. Is society neglecting its most valuable asset?

Editorial

Education today, with all its problems and complexities, provides a challenge for all of us — parents, teachers and students. Perhaps it is as students that we first begin to seriously face up to a series of challenges, large and small, in our everyday lives, and to realize the value of satisfaction gained by knowing we have made a sincere and substantial effort at success. Examinations, projects, essays and problems form some of these challenges, and from other fields come those of sporting, social and community affairs, and of the myriad other activities helping to fill the life of the student.

The task of compiling this magazine also came to me as a challenge; to present the achievements (that is, the answers of the individuals of Ryde High School to their challenges) as accurately as possible. The resulting magazine you see before you is truly the product of the individuals of Ryde High. It reflects the degree to which this particular group of students, parents and teachers has faced its challenge.

Finally, mention must be made of the invaluable help and advice in organizing the magazine provided by Mr. Hall, and by Mr. Hearn, editor during the previous two years.

Captain's Message

We are often told that our teenage years are the most impress onable ones of our lives — the years in which our character will develop, our opinions will form, and important decisions will be made; in other words, that our whole life's course will be governed to a large extent by our environment during youth. And yet, those of us in Form 6 have spent almost six of these years at Ryde High. It is evident that this school has had, and will have a very profound effect on the lives of all of us. It has been a school life which has been perhaps the largest single factor in the moulding of the characters of each of us. Most of us have probably never been aware of this before.

However, now we are suddenly faced with the stark realisation that, within a very short time, the environment of our school, the environment in which we have lived a large portion of our lives over the past six years, the environment which has formed an integral part of our personality, will be cut off from us, and we will be thrust alone into some situation, to which we will have to re-adapt. We will no longer have things handed to us as we have at school. Our responsibilities will increase. In other words we will be faced with a new kind of life.

In order to cope successfully with this new environment we will each need a strong and adaptable character. But where will it come from? Surely we should have it already. The answer is that our school, although it protects and helps us while we attend, must simultaneously equ'p us sufficiently to take our place in the community. And I believe that our high school here at Ryde has succeeded in this respect.

Now that we reach the end of our schooling it is interesting to turn and look back over the school life we have experienced over the past years. Many of us have enjoyed rare opportunities which we may not onjoy again,

for instance the opportunity to associate with. and become friends with, at least 3 different American students, and the opportunity to participate in or otherwise enjoy two Gilbert and Sullivan productions. Then there are more normal but equally important opportunities such as school socials, balls and dances; perhaps the chance to fill the responsible and privileged position of prefect; participation in groups such as the choir, orchestra and other musical groups, I.S.C.F., clubs, e.g. Chess Club, Camera Club: membership of debating teams; and of course normal sports activities. We have enjoyed annual athletics and swimming carnivals, membership of grade teams and the chance to represent the school and to meet players from other schools, and the personal satisfaction of participating in a physical sports activity. And, of course, there is that ever-apparent realisation that we are at school to work and study. We have faced a few public examinations, as well as normal yearly, half-yearly and trial examinations, and perhaps some have even enjoyed studying and learning some of the subjects. As we progress to senior years we realise that we have to fight against our friends to achieve what we want academically. Indeed, to be able to cope satisfactorily with the pressures of study, especially in sixth form is a real and constant effort. And all of us have been able to form many real friendships with fellow students, and, especially in senior years, with teachers - friendships which have been, and will be, of great benefit

There is no doubt that school has been of prime importance in our lives, and I think I am speaking for the whole of sixth form, when I say that our years at Ryde High will be years that we will always remember.

Captain's Message

This year we learn that the Government has allotted an increase of 38% on educational expenditure in the last Federal Budget. What has prompted the Government to give such a vast increase, and why has education assumed so much importance lately? Surely it cannot be said that the reason lies solely in the forthcoming elections? It is, in fact, a response to immediate pressures and a growing recognition of the value of education in modern society.

The immediate causes stem mainly from the pressure of an increased school population without a proportionate expansion of teaching facilities. The results are larger classes, fewer classrooms, a shortage of qualified teachers and a greater pressure on the school to provide facilities. Student and staff unrest has been the result of dissatisfaction with this situation. However the education system in Australia has not reached a point of crisis. Students are receiving a satisfactory education and in New South Wales the system was modernised by the Wyndham Scheme and is under revision, and therefore it cannot be said that the methods are outmoded. Why then has this active recognition of the importance of education taken place in our society?

Firstly, it has been recognised that Australia's future progress depends on the education of the young people today. It is the duty of the school to meet the demands of society, to see that a young person is adequately educated to become a useful member of the community, and to support himself and possibly a family. Young people must not be deprived of a good education; after all, the future Einsteins, T. S. Eliots and Churchills will come from the young people of today. In addition, students should, in their high school years, begin to develop into well adjusted citizens, ready to accept responsibilities, hav-


ing an awareness of both their restrictions and their liberties, and recognising their responsibilities to other people and the institutions of society.

Secondly, people are recognising that an emphasis on individual needs is important, that a certain amount of selection and specialisation must take place in school. Since these years of adolescence are the most impressionable and rapidly developing of a student's life, he must be encouraged to choose the course of studies and cultural interests which appeal to him most. These twin needs, educational and social, cannot be fulfilled without money and effort. Unless an interest is taken in the guiding of the aims of education, schools could be reduced to a low level of efficiency, producing mediocre citizens and students, instead of the best.


Having almost completed six years of my education at Ryde High School, and with the awareness that in a few weeks I shall attend it no more. I now have the chance to view this stage of my life from a more or less objective standpoint. It is possible to see now the purposes of all aspects of my education, and I can now judge their value in my particular situation. I am able to select from my knowledge, in order to take on a career of my choice, one in which I will be happy, and which will be of value. Above all, I can see that school life will have a lasting impression upon me, that when faced with a difficult situation in later life, it will invariably be what I have learnt at school that will determine my response.

This, from my point of view, is the reason for the strong emphasis being placed on education today. I see it as a matter of vital importance to society, and one in which every student is involved.





CAPTAINS' MEETINGS

This year a series of Captains' Meetings have been held for the first time. They were first suggested by the Captain of Meadowbank High School, and since April representatives from many schools in the area have been meeting about once a month at Meadowbank to discuss matters concerning high school life, Some of the schools are as far away as Strathfield and Homebush, but the bulk of them are in this district: North Ryde, Malvina, Marsden, Hunter's Hill and many more. It was originally suggested that the School Captains and Vice-Captains represent their schools at these meetings, but any 6th Form or even 5th Form students are welcome to take their place.

The purpose of these meetings is to afford an exchange of ideas concerning immediate school and community problems. On principle, no teacher is present at the meetings, except perhaps to listen to our discussions. We confer in a completely informal atmosphere, and thus we can get to know the student leaders of other schools. This is perhaps the most important aspect of these meetings, because we are in the position to forge a link between the schools of this district which may, in time, be greatly strengthened.

This year we discussed many problems, ranging from the values of the School Council system to long hair, from student radicalism to canteen provisions, from arousing school spirit to the responsibilities of the school with regard to social life. Perhaps the most important of our discussions were those concerning the School Council system, and the lack of adequate library facilities in the surrounding district.

We were fortunate because at the meeting there were some schools which functioned under a School Council system, some under a Prefect system and some possessed both, so there was a wide cross-section of principles and arguments, Descriptions of the functioning of the different School Councils were given and arguments for and against were voiced. Advantages and disadvantages could be seen in both systems, and although no system was generally voted better than the other, the importance of the discussion lay in our opportunity to apply the ideas to our own school, and to learn of methods which might cope with our particular problems.

When it came to the question of library facilities, everyone was keen to know why libraries in this area were understocked. One student investigated and it was discovered that the chief problem was not lack of finance, but an accumulating backlog of unprocessed books, and this was found to be the problem in a

number of schools. One solution arrived at was to engage the assistance of willing, responsible students in their free time to help get the books onto the shelves. There are many other such problems in schools yet to be solved.

We feel these meetings are an important innovation. They are a means of voicing the opinions of students concerned with the problems of their school and community. If any changes need to be made this is certainly the way to go about it. We hope that next year these meetings will be continued and strengthened so that their influence will be more strongly and widely felt in the school and the community.

NARRABRI VISIT

Following the precedent set in 1968, a number of Geography students from Ryde High were billeted by Narrabri High students in Narrabri for a few days early in May. BIAFRA AND WORLD FAMINE

"For God's sake airlift more baby food immediately. Thousands of children dving daily. Situation appalling.'

These words were part of a telegram from a missionary in Biafra, appealing for more aid to assist the beseiged territory in Nigeria

Throughout the world civil aid groups and churches are collecting money and food for Biafra while the leaders of the warring groups sit and argue. The Federal Government of Nigeria refuses to allow the territory of Biafra to leave the Nigerian Federation and the leaders of the seccessionists are just as adamant that they will not remain with Nigeria. While the arguments continue, Biafra is rapidly dying of starvation. Nigerian jets shoot down every aircraft which tries to enter Biafra and even International Red Cross aircraft have not been excluded from attack. Federal Nigerian troops surround the territory held by the Biafrans and are reducing it slowly every day. Within the territory, missionaries estimate that 6,000 children are dying every day from starvation and disease. This is despite the fact that thousands of tons of relief supplies are waiting at airports and ports near Nigeria, but the Nigerians will not allow the supplies to be shipped to the Biafrans, unless mercy planes are prepared to take the risk of being shot down.

This is the distressing situation prevailing in Biafra. A small country being literally annihilated by its enemies, not necessarily with arms, but by sheer acts of inhumanity. It is a common sight to see a lifeless body of a young child in the street; his hair rotting, his bones protruding noticeably from under his decaying skin and his spleen bloated like a large balloon. It is depressing that children must be subject to such conditions in a war such as this. However, in a time of crisis all must suffer. The adults are sturdier and will possess life slightly longer. With the present generation dwindling and the future generation almost non-existent, it is certain that the Biafrans will cease to exist as a race unless the urgent help which is greatly necessitated is supplied.

In general the prospects of famine are plain. The Australian Freedom from Hunger Campaign, conducted in October of last year, raised approximately \$900,000 to help millions of people who are dying from starvation and poverty diseases; diseases brought about by malnutrition. During the past five years the public's most generous response has raised \$5.5 million, roughly the cost of one of Australia's new F-111 aircraft or one-fifteenth the cost of the Sydney Opera House, both of which have proved to be controversial topics. In the U.S., Americans have raised \$10 million in three years for famine relief. However, this is

compared with the National Aeronautical Space Administration's complex space programme which has drained the purses of American citizens for 200 billion dollars to finance their Apollo probe. Lately, since the lunar missions have finally reached an orbit of the moon, much speculation has been cast upon the fangled Lunar Module - 10 million dollars worth of vital equipment which after brief usage, is cast away in a self-destructive orbit around the sun. The achievements of the Apollo Mission are labelled as a step toward an assistance to mankind as well as creating peace and bondage throughout the nations of the world. In my opinion the insistence of man to delve into space is redundant when a crisis such as Biafra exists on earth

Measured by these standards it is clear that few Australians, Americans and people of the world in general really appreciate the seriousness of the world's food problems. Nor do we fully understand the poverty and inadequate nutrition under which two-thirds of the world's people somehow manage to sustain life. Unless the technically advanced countries, such as the U.S. and Australia. come to grips with this mounting food crisis, our children will live in a world in which famine is commonplace. Can we really afford to wait for the barbaric disorder that will surely result, as rich nations grow richer, and the poorer nations reel under the pressures of exploding populations and dwindling food supplies?


